### Fort Frances jump-starts the 2014 Relay For Life

Fort Frances Ontario residents are banding together to help fight against cancer by lending their support to the 2014 Canadian Cancer Society Relay For Life, to be held on Friday June 20 at Fort Frances High School.

Last year 168 participants in the 2013 Fort Frances Relay For Life joined together to raise a grand total of \$77,338. Out of that total, \$31,482 was donated back into the community to help the Riverside Health Care facility purchase necessary equipment to treat

patients, such as an ultra sound machine and specialized equipment for inserting PICC lines (peripherally inserted central catheters). This year the goal is to raise \$75,000 to fund life-saving cancer research and help provide support for people living with cancer.

"We are very fortunate to have received this generous funding from the 2013 Relay For Life. It will provide staff training and specialized equipment for peripherally inserted central catheters (PICC lines) at Riverside Health Care's La

Verendrye General Hospital site. This new service will improve access to care for cancer patients and patients requiring extended antibiotic therapy, among others. Providing this high quality service closer to home is a key component of our strategic plan and we definitely appreciate this funding from Relay For Life," states Riverside Health Care, president & CEO, Allan Katz.

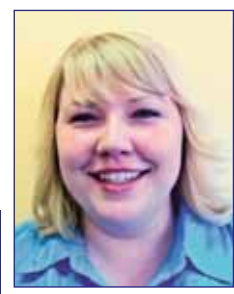
