Community members from across the district as well as business owners and municipal and first nations representatives stopped by the newly expanded New Gold office located at 5967 Highway 11/71 to tour the space and show their support for the mining company.

The expansion included additional offices as well as a

boardroom, meeting room, reception area and kitchen facilities. Select Construction of Emo were contracted to do the project.

Visitors also had an opportunity to meet newly appointed General Manager, Grant Goddard who will oversee the Rainy River Project.

Bob Gallagher, the President and CEO of New Gold, was there to participate in the ribbon cutting and invited district representatives to join him.

After the formalities, guests were treated to a BBQ with refreshments and cupcakes for dessert. As part of New Gold's emphasis on supporting local business, all local meat was used for the BBQ, supplied by Rainy River Meats.

The crowd assembled was visiting with New Gold staff

and asking questions about the project.

“We're thrilled”, said Brenda Cooke, CAO for the Township of Emo. “We're going to do everything possible to accommodate them and be smart developers for them. We're going to do what's right for our community”.

“It's super”, said Ken Fisher, who sits as a Councillor for Emo.

“100% behind the project”, added Ted Kaemingh, a local business owner.

Ken Perry and John Albanese, Councillors for the Town of Fort Frances were also there to show their support.

“We're going to think positive about the project”, said Albanese. “We wish them luck. It's a good thing for the district and good for Fort Frances. We look forward to supporting them the best we can”.

“They could become the major employer in the Rainy River district. You have to smile about that after everything that's happened”, enthused Perry.

Norbert Dufresne, a Councillor for the Township of Sioux Narrows-Nestor Falls was on hand to show support from north of Emo.

“It's all great stuff”, he echoed the sentiments of others. “We're behind all economic development in the district”. Although Sioux Narrows-Nestor Falls is part of the Lake of the Woods district, Dufresne adds, “We're next door neighbours. We're as

close (to the project site) as Emo”.

Brian Beers, who is the Account Representative from Wilson's Business Solutions was there with his co-worker Leanne Quesnel.

“It's great! They are an awesome company. Very supportive with the local businesses. We couldn't be any happier”, enthused Beers.

Currently, New Gold has about twenty staff employed on-site who range from construction workers and core cutters to geologists and supervisors.

The office in Emo currently has nine staff members:

Lincoln Dunn, First Nations Engagement Specialist; Kaylie Lundgren, Administrative Coordinator; Andrea Curtis, Accounts Payable Officer; Stacey Jack, Community Coordinator; Daryl Ellis, Director of Finance; Moiz Lakhani, Senior Accountant; Christine Ruppenstein, Human Resources Supervisor, Sarah Thompson, Materials Manager and Grant Goddard, General Manager.

Kyle Standfield is the Vice-President of Environment and Sustainability. His office is located in Thunder Bay along with two other staff members.

The New Gold head offices are in Oakville, Ontario and Vancouver, British Columbia where another twenty staff members are employed.

Christine Ruppenstein, Human Resources Supervisor is excited about the growth of the company. “We're going to be bringing in a lot of good and

new people to Town. We're going to be growing pretty steadily in the next couple of months”.

Senior managers are currently being recruited and that is where the expertise of General Manager Grant Goddard is needed to build a team.

Goddard joined New Gold on July 2, 2014 and has been in Emo for about three weeks.

“I am renting a house in Emo, in the new sub division”, he says. His wife will be joining him in the fall.

“My focus will be on creating and building a team”, explained Goddard, adding that there is already a great group of people to work with.

“I'm excited to be part of creating something like this. Everyone is supportive of it and they want to be a part of it”.

New Gold is currently awaiting approval of their Environmental Assessment from the Federal government.

“It's moving in the right direction and I am confident we'll have the EA approval by mid-December”, he said.

Once the Environmental Assessment is approved, New Gold must obtain a series of permits to proceed and this is planned for the first quarter of 2015. Pre-construction is planned in February/March where the pit will see six 240 ton trucks come in to start hauling materials from the ground.

The construction phase will see about four hundred workers and New Gold plans to have

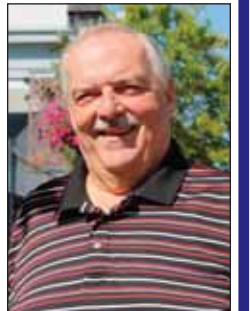

about six hundred employed in their operation of the mine. This will evolve over the next five years.

"We'll see about 125 people in pit operations next year", he said.

New Gold will have an em-

phasis on developing locals for their operations. "We're going to be looking for people who have the skills, who want to work and want to be part of a family."

We'll be growing slowly throughout the end of this year, and will be adding managers and other staff. About a half a dozen plus", noted Goddard.

As a new employee of New Gold, Goddard is most impressed with their values and corporate philosophy. "Their focus is on doing what's right, being creative, delivering on what they say they're going to do, developing employees and teamwork". He also emphasized the importance of safety.

"We will work safely and be respectful of the environment, especially as leaders, we have to model this. We must lead by example".

Goddard admits that housing will be a challenge as the operations grow although he is optimistic that this will be overcome.

"There will be a series of solutions that make up the final solution", one being the commitment to hiring local workers and utilizing local services.

Goddard is pleased with the efforts of the team prior to his coming in establishing "good relationships" with First Nations communities.

"We are progressing well with Participation Agreements with six or seven of the First Nations communities", he said.

"We are committed to working together with all of the communities. Our goal is to be a sustainable, successful, reliable, with no surprises company, with its roots in the community", emphasized Goddard.

"It is firmly about people, having the right people. That's the fun of it...building all of that".

The stage show is being brought in to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of World War I and the 75th Anniversary of World War II.

Soldiers of Song features The Dumbells. Who are The Dumbells? They were a vaudeville act formed in 1917 near Vimy Ridge. They were a group of soldiers taken from active duty to entertain Canadian troops. They performed on the front lines to help bolster the soldiers' morale. They performed songs and sketches

about life on the trenches.

The Dumbells went on to earn world-wide recognition and acclaim. They were the first Canadian production to have a hit on Broadway and they are known as the pioneers of Canadian sketch comedy.

The Legion and Museum is excited to be bringing in this highly acclaimed show to Fort Frances

Alfreda Easton, who is the President of the Legion Branch #29 Auxiliary also noted that other activities are planned for this upcoming commemoration.

"There will be a Wine & Cheese event at the Fort Frances Museum on Thursday, September 18th from 4:30 - 8:00 p.m.", she said, adding that it would kick off the Museum's exhibit that will feature pictures, stories and memorabilia from these two signifi-
